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Description

Assessment summary table for the hake stock in ICES subareas 4, 6, and 7, and ICES divisions 3.a, 8.a, 8.b, and 8.d (northern hake stock), as well as for the sardine stocks: northern stock (ICES divisions 8.a, 8.b, and 8.d) and southern stock (ICES divisions 8.c and 9.a).

The data corresponds to the assessment conducted in 2021 and was derived using the **icesSAG** package. Environmental data is also reported, including the Atlantic Multi-decadal Oscillation (AMO) and the North Atlantic Oscillation (NAO) indices.

A list where items correspond to the assessment summary tables for the ICES northern hake stock, the ICES southern and northern sardine stocks, and the environmental data frame.

The stock's data can be obtained using the following R code:

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Description

Analyze and model the relationships between surplus production (SP) and environmental covariable(s) to test whether productivity changes in response to environmental fluctuations. The analysis is conducted in three steps:

- (1) Correlation Analysis: Assess the correlation between the standardized environmental variable(s), at different delays (lags), and the KBPM residuals using Pearson's correlation or autoregressive models. See details.
- (2) Variable Selection: Determine which lagged environmental variable(s) will be included in the environmental KBPM models.
- (3) Environmental Fitting: Fit the KBPM model incorporating environmental effects as both additive and multiplicative effects (see details).

- `ar_cor`: optional. Logical. By default, this argument is FALSE, meaning the correlation between the KBPM residuals and the environmental variable(s) is analyzed using the Pearson correlation measure. If set to TRUE, the relationship is instead analyzed by fitting autoregressive (AR) models, with each lagged environmental variable included as an explanatory covariate for KBPM residuals. The environmental variable associated with the model that has the lowest Akaike Information Criterion (AIC) is selected for inclusion in the environmental KBPM fit. See details.
 - `plot3d`: optional. Logical. If set to TRUE, 3D plots are generated, displaying the surplus production curve across a range of values for the environmental variable(s). The default is FALSE.
 - `multicovar`: optional. Logical. If TRUE, the environmental model incorporates all input environmental covariates simultaneously. By default, this argument is FALSE, meaning that only the environmental variable with the highest correlation (after lagging, if applicable) is included in the model.
- `plot_out` Logical. If set to TRUE, a file containing the plot of the environmental fits is created. The default value is taken from the input in the `knobi_fit` function.
- `plot_dir` Optional. Directory where the folder for saving the plots will be created. Required when `plot_out = TRUE`. The default value is taken from the input in the `knobi_fit` function.
- `plot_filename` Optional. Name of the folder that will contain the plots. Required when `plot_out = TRUE`. The default value is taken from the input in the `knobi_fit` function.

Details

It is important to mention that the environmental variable(s), in a first step, are standardized, in order to make their scale and magnitude comparable. To do this, each variable is subtracted from its mean and divided by its standard deviation.

The additive environmental model adds the following term on the right-hand side of Eq. (1) or Eq. (2) described in `knobi_fit`: $cX_{t-lag}B_t$, being X_{t-lag} the environmental variable at time $t - lag$ and B_t the biomass or SSB at time t .

The multiplicative environmental model multiplies the right-hand side of Eq. (1) or Eq. (2) by $\exp(cX_{t-lag})$.

In the case of these models, the estimated biological reference points (BRPs) correspond to a value of the scaled environmental variable equal to the mean of the time series, i.e., $X_t = 0$, which cancels out the effect of the parameter c . The estimates of the remaining parameters included in Eq. (1) or Eq. (2), and therefore for the BRPs as well, will differ from the base model due to the inclusion of environmental effects. For more details, such as the calculation of BRPs as a function of the environmental variable, see the vignettes.

If `ar_cor = TRUE`, the correlation analysis between the `knobi_fit` residuals and the environmental variable(s) is conducted as follows:

First, an AR model is fitted to the KBPM base residuals:

$$r_t = \sum_{i=1}^{\rho} \beta_i r_{t-i} + \epsilon_t$$

where r_t is the KBPM base residual for year t , and ρ is the AR model order, estimated as the maximum lag at which the absolute value of the residuals' partial autocorrelation exceeds $qnorm(0.975)/\sqrt{N_r}$, with N_r being the length of the residuals series.

AR models are then fitted to the residuals incorporating each lagged environmental variable X_{t-lag} as an explanatory covariate:

$$r_t = \sum_{i=1}^{\rho} \beta_i r_{t-i} + X_{t-lag} + \epsilon_t$$

for $lag = 0, 1, \dots, nlag$. Then, we have one autoregressive model for each lag.

The lagged environmental variable whose AR model has the lowest AIC is selected for inclusion in the environmental KBPM fit. If none improve the AIC compared to the base AR model, no environmental covariate is added.

It is important to highlight that the results include the analysis of the AR model only with the base model residuals in order to determine the need for coupling environmental information, considering that it would not be necessary if this model shows a lower AIC, even reducing the number of parameters to fit.

Value

A list containing the results of the three-step environmental analysis:

- `add`: estimates of the additive model parameters.
- `mult`: estimates of the multiplicative model parameters.
- `BRPs`: reference points (BRPs) estimates for each model (see details).
- `df`: data frame with the information used in the fit.
- `selected_var`: environmental variable(s) used in the fit.
- `selected_lag`: data frame providing the time lag of the environmental variable(s) in the KBPM fit.
- `lag_cor`: correlation between the environmental variable(s) and the KBPM residuals for each time lag.
- `env_aic`: if `ar_cor = TRUE`, AIC values of each autoregressive model (see details).
- `scaled_var`: standardized environmental variable(s) used in the fit.
- `plots3D`: list with 3D plot objects (if `plot3d = TRUE`).
- `residuals`: Pearson residuals from each model fit (base, additive, and multiplicative).
- `performance_metrics`: array of performance and accuracy measures for each model, including those from the `error_table` output of `knobi_fit`, plus an F-test comparing environmental models to the base model.

The function also returns plots in the graphics window and saves them (if `plot_out = TRUE`) to the specified directory. The first plot shows the correlation analysis between the environmental variable(s) and the base residuals. The second shows fitted SP values from all models. If `multicovar = FALSE` and `plot3d = TRUE`, 3D plots are also returned. If `multicovar = TRUE`, a plot with Pearson correlations among environmental variables is included.

KBPM fit

Description

This function, that is the main function of the knobi package, fits a type of surplus production models named known-biomass production models (KBPM) (MacCall, 2002). The surplus production curve is fitted using the observed catch time series and the biomass or SSB (Spawning Stock Biomass) estimates derived from the fit of another stock assessment model.

Arguments

data	<p>A list containing the data.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Catch: catch time series observations. • Biomass: biomass time series estimated through a data-rich stock assessment model. If available, otherwise enter SSB in the next argument. • SSB: spawning stock biomass time series estimated through a data-rich stock assessment model. If available, otherwise introduce biomass in the previous argument. • years: optional. Years associated to the observed catch time series. By default, an increasing natural sequence from 1 to the total number of catch observations. • Stock: optional. Character string with the stock name for using in the plot subtitles. • Recruitment: optional. Recruitment time series estimated through a data-rich stock assessment model. See details. • F_input: optional. Fishing mortality time series estimated through a data-rich stock assessment model. See details. • RP: optional. Estimates of the following biological reference points derived from the fit of a data-rich stock assessment model (see details): <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – MSY: Maximum Sustainable Yield. – F_MS Y: fishing mortality at MSY. – B_MS Y: biomass at MSY (or SSB at MSY depending on the value of the 'method' argument, see control list). – K: carrying capacity.
control	<p>A list containing the following control parameters.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • pella: logical. If TRUE, the Pella-Tomlinson model is applied; if FALSE (default), the Schaefer model is used. See details. • start_r: optional. Starting value for the growth rate parameter r (intrinsic rate of natural increase). See details. • start_K: optional. Starting value for the carrying capacity parameter K (maximum population size where growth remains positive). See details. • start_p: optional. plot_filename	optional. Name of the folder that will contain the plot files. By default, "knobi_results". Required when plot_out=TRUE.

Details

The KBPMs implemented in the current package are explained below.

Schaefer model (1954) (Eq. 1):

$$SP_t = r\bar{B}_t(1 - (\bar{B}_t/K))$$

where SP_t is the surplus production, \bar{B}_t is the average biomass or SSB (mean of two consecutive years), r is the population growth rate parameter, and K is the carrying capacity. The subscript t denotes the time (years).

Pella and Tomlinson model (1969) (Eq. 2):

$$SP_t = (r/p)\bar{B}_t(1 - (\bar{B}_t/K)^p)$$

where SP_t is the surplus production, \bar{B}_t is the average biomass or SSB, r is the population growth rate parameter, K is the carrying capacity and p is the asymmetry parameter. The subscript t denotes the time (years).

It should be noted that, in order to associate the average biomass or SSB with the catch series, the SSB time series must be one year longer than the catch series. If both time series have the same length, the last year of catch data will be excluded, and a warning will be displayed in the R console.

The recruitment values and the F_input estimates are included to get an overview of the stock status, but are not needed for the KBPM fitting. Similarly, the input reference points are only used for comparison purposes.

KBPMs have also proven their usefulness for the multispecies management objectives. The KBPM approach can be applied to analyze the joint dynamics of the targeted fish species within a community, using the aggregated biomass and catch data, defining in this way a simple data-limited ecosystem model to assess the ecosystem status (see example).

Value

The results of the KBPM fit include the following:

- params: model parameters estimates.
- df: the data used for the model.
- BRPs: biological reference points estimates:
 - K: carrying capacity.
 - MSY: maximum sustainable yield (MSY).
 - B_MSY: biomass at MSY.
 - F_MSY: fishing mortality at MSY.
 - MSYoverK: ratio of MSY and K.
- residuals: Pearson's residuals calculated as (observations-estimates)/sd(observations).
- performance_metrics: data frame of accuracy and model performance measures:
 - SER: standard error of the regression, calculated as the root of the rate between the sum of residual squares and the degrees of freedom of the regression.
 - R-squared: coefficient of determination.
 - adj-R-squared: adjusted coefficient of determination.

- AIC: Akaike information criterion.
- RMSE: root mean squared error (observed vs. estimated values).
- MAPE: mean absolute percentage error (observed vs. estimated values).
- input: the input list updated with the annual average biomass (`$input$Average_Biomass`), the surplus production (`$input$SP`) and the F estimates derived from the fit (`$input$F_output`).
- control: the updated control settings of the fit.
- optimx: list of some results provided by `optimx`:
 - value: value of the objective function in the minimization process.
 - convergence: integer code. '0' indicates successful completion in the optimization.
 - message: character string giving any additional information returned by the optimizer, or NULL.

The plots are displayed in the plot window and also saved (if `plot_out=TRUE`) in the provided directory or in the current one (if `plot_dir` is not provided). The following input quantities are plotted: fishing mortality time series, SSB or biomass, surplus production and catch time series. Plots of catch over fishing mortality, fishing mortality over SSB (or biomass), and catch over SSB (or biomass) time series with a smooth line from a "loess" regression are also available. Plot of input-output time series of fishing mortality are also provided and includes horizontal lines for both, input and output, fishing mortalities at MSY (one line if input `F_MSY` is NULL). Fishing mortality relative to `F_MSY` is also plotted including an horizontal line at one (note that values greater than 1 indicate an F greater than `F_MSY`). The analogous SSB (or biomass) plots are also reported. On the other hand, the fitted surplus production curve is plotted twice with the SSB (or biomass) and SP observations (first) and with the catch and SP observations (second). Finally, a plot with the KBPM residuals is reported.

KBPM projections

Description

This function forecasts population and fishery dynamics under a defined set of management targets. It projects the time series of biomass (or SSB) and the surplus production for a set of future catch or fishing mortality scenarios.

Arguments

knobi_results	The output object of <code>knobi_fit</code> function (main package function).
env_results	Optional. The output object of <code>knobi_env</code> function.
c	Optional. A vector, data frame, or matrix specifying the catch values for each projected year. Multiple catch scenarios can be defined, with each column in the data frame or matrix representing a different scenario. For a single scenario, the length of the vector must match the number of projected years; for multiple scenarios, the number of rows must match the projected years. Projections are based on either future catch values or fishing mortality values, so only one of the two arguments, 'c' or 'f', is required.
f	Optional. A vector, data frame, or matrix specifying the fishing mortality values for each projected year. Multiple fishing mortality scenarios can be defined, with each column in the data frame or matrix representing a different scenario. For a single scenario, the length of the vector must match the number of projected years; for multiple scenarios, the number of rows must match the projected years. Projections are based on either future catch values or fishing mortality values, so only one of the two arguments, 'c' or 'f', is required.

env	Optional. Environmental variable(s) projections required if the environmental fit is provided to forecast the population and fishery dynamics. This fit considers the variable(s) selected in the <code>knobi_env</code> function. If the 'multicovar' argument of <code>knobi_env</code> is FALSE, this argument is a vector, data frame or matrix containing the values of the environmental covariates (unstandardized) (cols) for the projection years (rows). On the other hand, if the 'multicovar' argument of <code>knobi_env</code> is TRUE, the current argument must be a list, and each entry must be a data frame or matrix corresponding to each environmental scenario containing the values of the considered covariates for each scenario.
plot_out	Logical. If TRUE, a file containing the plot of the retrospective fits is created. The default value is the input in the <code>knobi_fit</code> function.
plot_dir	Optional. Directory to create the folder and save the plots. Required when 'plot_out=TRUE'. The default value is taken from the input of the <code>knobi_fit</code> function.
plot_filename	Optional. Name of the folder that will contain the plots. Required when 'plot_out=TRUE'. The default value is taken from the input of the <code>knobi_fit</code> function.

Value

A list containing the projection results.

- `df`: data frame containing the projected time series. The rows correspond to the projection years, while the columns represent stock quantities: biomass or SSB, surplus production (SP), catch (C), and fishing mortality (F). Three additional columns specify the catch or fishing mortality scenario (Sc), the model used, and the environmental scenario (EnvSc).
- `plots`: list containing the plots with the projections. Each plot is a panel plot that includes four subplots representing biomass or SSB, surplus production, fishing mortality, and catches for each catch or fishing mortality scenario and for each environmental scenario (if they is provided).

The resulting plots are displayed in the plot window and are also saved (if `plot_out="TRUE"`) in the provided directory or in the same directory as `link{knobi_fit}`.

KBPM retrospective analysis

Description

This function performs a retrospective analysis that evaluates the robustness of the KBPM fit to the systematic deletion of recent data.

Arguments

knobi_results	The object resulting from the knobi_fit function, which are the results of the base KBPM fit.
nR	Number of retrospective peels to fit the model peeling off from 1 to nR years of data. 5 by default. See details.
yR	Optional. A vector representing the final years of the catch time series for each of the retrospective models. See details.
yR0	Optional. A vector representing the starting years of the catch time series for each of the retrospective models. This vector must be the same length as the yR vector. By default, the catch time series is assumed to start in the same year as the original fit.
env_results	Optional. The object resulting from the knobi_env function. A list containing the results of the environmental KBPM fit. If this argument is provided, the retrospective analysis is carried out for the base and the environmental KBPM models.
plot_out	Logical. If TRUE, a file containing the plot of the retrospective fits is created. The default value is the input in the knobi_fit function.
plot_dir	Optional. Directory to create the folder and save the plots. Required when 'plot_out=TRUE'. The default value is taken from the input of the knobi_fit function.
plot_filename	Optional. Name of the folder that will contain the plots. Required when 'plot_out=TRUE'. The default value is taken from the input of the knobi_fit function.

Details

There are different options for defining retrospective fits:

(1) Usage of `nR` argument. This argument specifies the number of retrospective peels. By using this argument, it is implied that the retrospective fits will consist of systematically deleting the last year of data, up to the number of years specified by `nR`.

(2) Usage of `yR` argument. This argument specifies the final years of the catch time series for each of the retrospective models, providing greater flexibility in choosing the years from which to delete information. The number of retrospective fits will correspond to the length of the `yR` vector. Additionally, different starting years can be set using the `yR0` argument.

If both arguments, `nR` and `yR`, are provided, the package will prioritize the use of `yR`.

As described in the `knobi_env` function details, in the case of the environmental models, both the estimated biological reference points and the plotted production curve correspond to a value of the scaled environmental variable equal to the mean of the time series, i.e. $X_t = 0$, which cancels out the environmental effect in the equations defining both models. For more details, such as the calculation of BRPs as a function of the environmental variable, see vignettes.

Value

A list containing the results of the retrospective analysis, including parameter estimates and reference points for each model. The estimated surplus production curves from the retrospective analysis are also plotted, with a panel where each graph represents the curves for each model in case of considering environmental models. The plot is displayed in the plot window and saved (if `plot_out=TRUE`) in the specified directory or in the current directory.
